



BOXING AT YANKEE STADIUM

The ballpark and "Palookaville"—the zenith and nadir of pro boxing. The greatest status symbol for a fighter—outside of a title—was to fight in a ballpark. It was one of boxing's highest honors—like investiture in the Royal Order of the Garter. From the fiction-

al Terry Malloy to the visceral Jack Dempsey, it was a high honor to box in a ballpark. And the greatest ballpark of them all was Yankee Stadium. Of all the ballparks in all the towns across the length and breadth of the United States, none holds the place in our minds and hearts, in our collective consciousness, as does Yankee Stadium. It was—and remains—sport's Olympus.

This year marks the 75th Anniversary of Yankee Stadium, New York's answer to Vespa's dream.

This Diamond Jubilee is marked with glory and controversy. It seems only fitting that the finest tribute to the Stadium, arguably the world's most famous sports arena, is the current Yankee team, which has given the venue its 36th American League championship.

While the names of Ruth, Gehrig, DiMaggio, and Mantle are naturally synonymous with the glories of Yankee Stadium, those of Louis, Leonard, Robinson, Marciano, Dempsey, and Ali have also carved their names on the tablets of Yankee Stadium sporting lore.

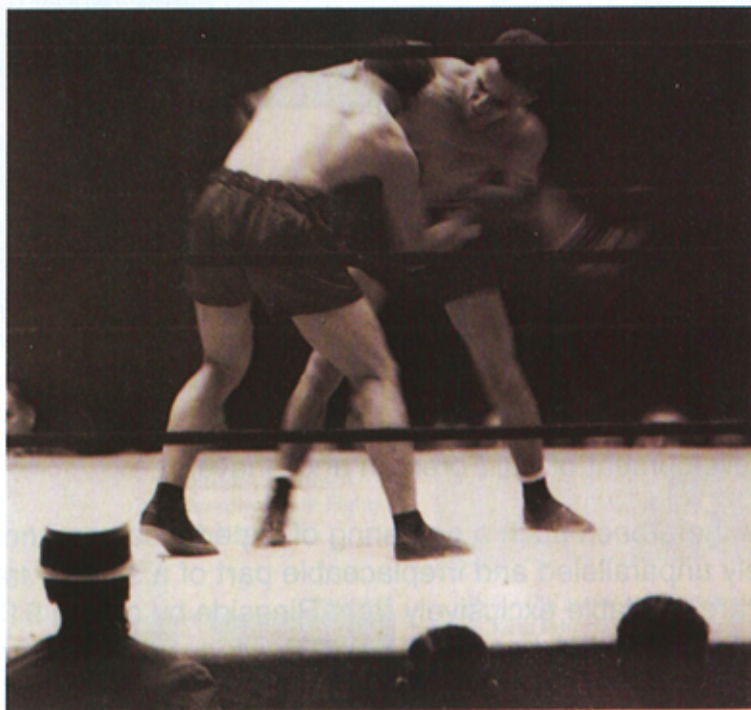
Forty-nine professional boxing cards graced the gray lady of the Bronx from 1923 to 1976. Yankee Stadium has been the crown jewel in boxing's diadem. While Madison Square Garden, in its four incarnations, may have hosted more bouts, and the Polo Grounds been home to matches of equally historic nature, no place in history has had as consistent a run of great fights between great fighters than the House that Ruth Built.

Only the biggest of the biggest, featuring the best of the best, have been highlighted at Yankee Stadium. From Dempsey vs. Sharkey through Ali vs. Norton, from Louis vs. Schmeling to Marciano vs. Moore, the most storied faces in ring history have strode this field of dreams.

Opened on April 18, 1923, before a seemingly apocryphal crowd of 74,217, George Herman (Babe) Ruth hit Yankee Stadium's first home run en route to a 4-1 victory over the Boston Red Sox. The Stadium was designed by the Osborn Engineering Company of Cleveland, Ohio.

"The House that Ruth Built" was borne of the desire of the

Yankees' landlords, the New York Giants, to evict them from the Polo Grounds. Having obtained the services of Babe Ruth, the Yankees had by now outrivaled their landlords in popularity—drawing 1,000,000 spectators in 1921 against the Giants' 700,000—something their irascible manager, John J. McGraw, could not stand. The Yankees had been tenants of the Giants at the Polo Grounds since 1913, partially as a result of then Yankee owner Frank Farrell's favor in allowing the Giants to play part of the 1911 season at Hilltop Park in Manhattan while fire damage to the Polo Grounds was being repaired. But by 1922, the Yankees had to go; and go they did—from the Polo Grounds at 157th Street and Eighth Avenue across the Harlem River to 161st Street and River Avenue in the Bronx, then a bucolic



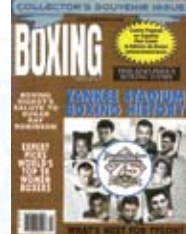
World lightweight champion Benny Leonard prepares to block a left hand thrown by southpaw Lew Tendler in the first world title bout in Yankee Stadium.

suburb of Manhattan.

The Yankees, behind Ruth and Murderers' Row, dominated the American League—and baseball—for decades to come. It has been said that Yankee Stadium was a nightmare—not to the Yankees, but to John McGraw.

Now, seventy-five years later, McGraw's Giants play in San Francisco while the Yankees still prowls their Bronx home. The Giants left because the city's politicians, in their infinite lack of wisdom and hatred for tradition, refused to finance a new stadium for the Giants. Sound familiar?

But in the 1920s, with the city (meaning Manhattan and the Bronx) hosting two great stadiums and the Walker Law having come into existence in 1920, there were enough dates available in



the summer to allow professional boxing in those big ballparks. (Prior to this, Brooklyn's Washington Park, erstwhile home of the Dodgers, had been New York's only major league baseball park to host pro boxing. Ebbets Field, opened in 1913, would go on to hold more pro bouts than any other New York baseball stadium. But big championship fights could only be accommodated at the Polo Grounds and Yankee Stadium.)

Less than a month after its grand opening, Yankee Stadium played host to an all-star heavyweight card for the benefit of the Ann Morgan's Milk Fund. The show, held on May 12, 1923, featured Jess Willard, Luis Angel Firpo, and Fred Fulton in separate bouts and drew a gate of \$390,000 from a crowd estimated at 63,000. The Polo Grounds, forever to be Yankee Stadium's poor relation, got into the act on June 2, 1923, when Tom O'Rourke, backed by Giants owner Charles Stoneham's bankroll, staged the Johnny Kilbane-Eugene Criqui world featherweight title bout and drew an estimated 15,000 with a gate of \$105,000—far below expectations. O'Rourke, undaunted, came back sixteen days later, on June 18, to lose even more of Stoneham's money with the Jimmy Wilde-Pancho Villa world featherweight title bout, which drew 23,000 at the old horseshoe near Coogan's Bluff.

Yankee Stadium and the Polo Grounds would battle it out under the aegis of various promoters for supremacy as boxing's premier showcase over the next forty years. And, while the Polo Grounds came up with some of the most historically important matches in ring history—Dempsey-Firpo, Louis Conn I, Greb-Walker, Robinson-Turpin II, and Patterson-Johansson II—Yankee Stadium always meant the biggest of big fights.

The Stadium is now embroiled in a controversial battle between owner George Steinbrenner and the City Council. The Council wishes to keep Yankee Stadium, now a year older than the Polo Grounds at the time it was demolished in 1964—in the Bronx. Steinbrenner and the mayor prefer a new ballpark on Manhattan's west side, where then Manhattan borough president Hulan Jack proposed the erection of a new Polo Grounds in 1957. Perhaps the demolition of 600 acres around the Stadium—including the tearing down of various housing projects, tenements, "social" clubs, crack dens, and other rat holes—could save the great edifice. Whether Yankee Stadium remains as a viable sports facility or is reduced to a museum—a ruin like the ancient Roman Colosseum—its glory remains.

Madison Square Gardens has been able to preserve and transport its traditions behind a single name, four separate struc-

tures, and three different locations. Why shouldn't Yankee Stadium? Whether it becomes the victim of a class war waged by those who would be governor or is transported to new digs in Manhattan—where the Yankees served their first offerings to Gothamites after moving from Baltimore in 1903—the glory of Yankee Stadium, and all its wonderful 75 years—should be celebrated and revered.

Yankee Stadium's legacy in boxing, often overshadowed by the tremendous accomplishments of its baseball team and players, should be honored as well. Forty-seven of the 49 pro boxing shows at the House that Ruth Built have featured at least one Hall of Famer in its feature bout.

Herewith, a celebration of Yankee Stadium and Boxing in the Stadium's Diamond Jubilee Year.

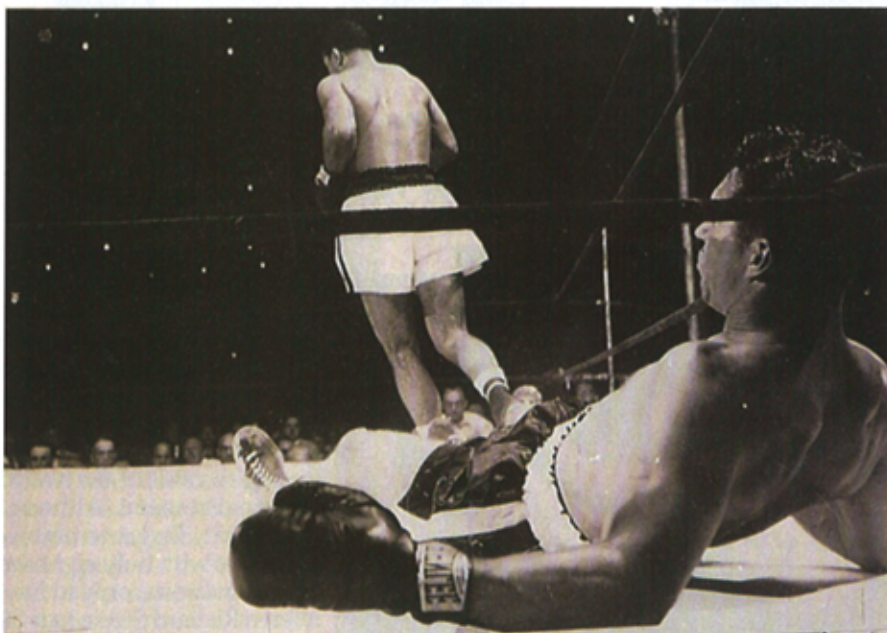

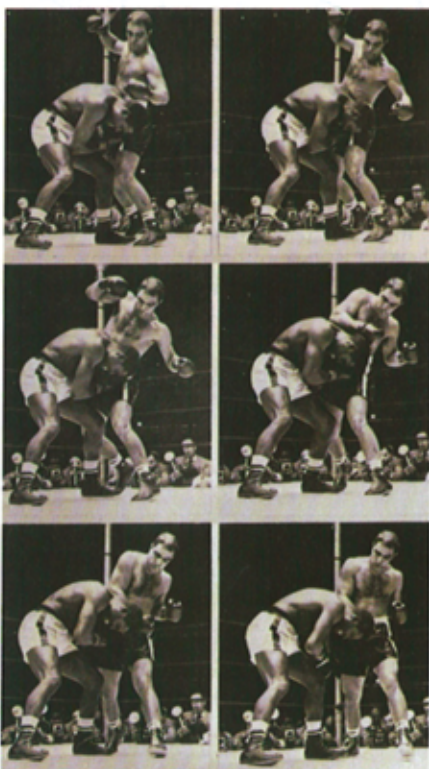
